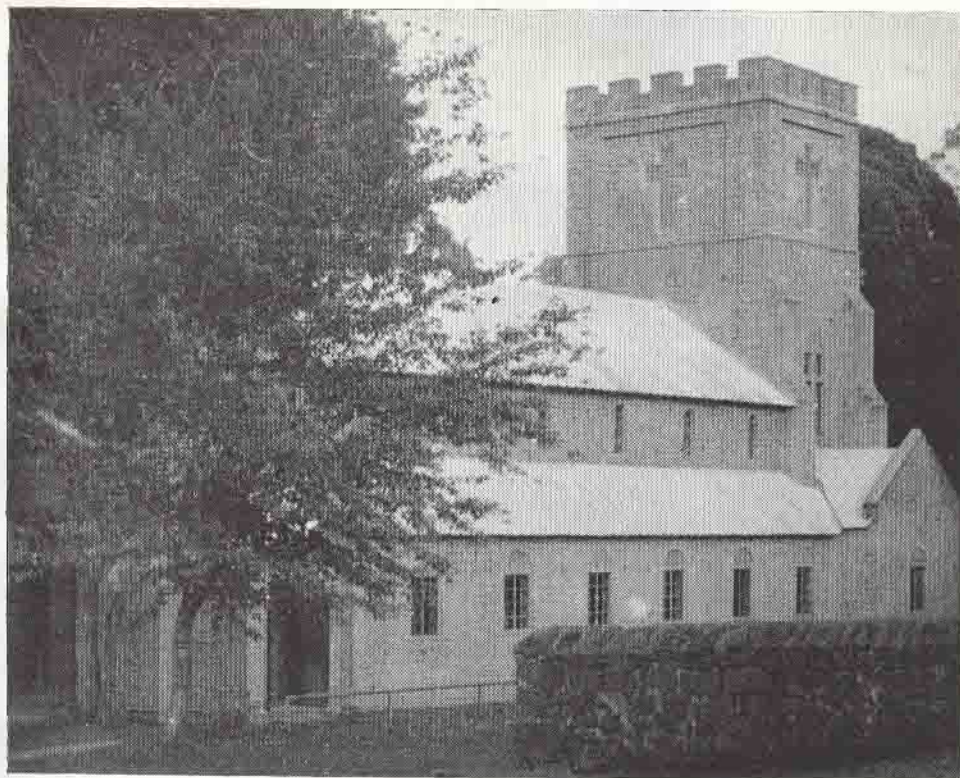

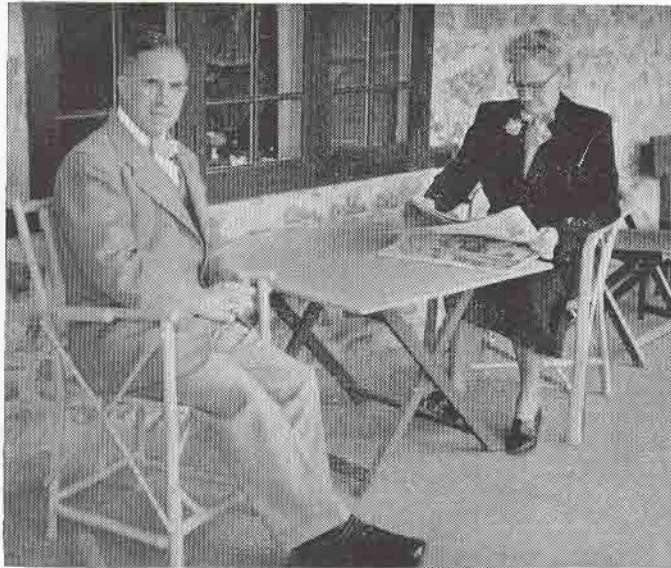

## MR. PHELPS

As we look around us we see a boarding school, well developed, well equipped, and functional. But here is a man who found things quite otherwise when he first arrived at Kodaikanal School in 1932. 'Papa', as he is affectionately called by the students, has seen many new buildings and improvements appear that must have been only dreams in the early days. The Science Building, the Chapel, Phelps' Hall, the Canteen, Wissahickon, a new dining room, the new bungalows on Bendy, and the field itself, have materialized as a result of his vision and able planning.

Many difficulties have naturally arisen in an undertaking such as Kodai School, and among these the war-year problems are some of the freshest in Mr. Phelps' memory. Enrollment decreased, and teachers became scarce, but the school carried on.

Since then the enrollment has seen a phenomenal rise, and now includes children of missionaries, and children whose parents are in commercial and diplomatic fields, whose homes range in location from Arabia to Indonesia.

After twenty-six years, so closely associated with the school, Papa leaves for a well-earned retirement. Both students and their parents appreciate Papa's leadership in which he has shown a great love for his students, a tolerance of their mistakes, a high faith in their future as good citizens, and a steadfast hope for the further development of the school.

## MRS. PHELPS

'Mama' made her first appearance at Kodaikanal School in 1938 as Boyer housemother. Here she displayed her interest in the lives and happiness of the students, an interest which is still evident today. Marriage in 1950 to Mr. Phelps took Mama from Boyer and placed her in Benderloch, a house which she keeps looking beautiful, and in which she entertains many guests of the school. She also assumed new duties on an administrative level, and has consequently served as Assistant Principal for some years. For the past year Mama's job has been taking on miscellaneous tasks, and, of course, making sure that the Principal was always at his best.

We remember Mama for her friendly attitude, for her sincere and helpful nature, especially since she knows the school from inside out. We wish for both Mama and Papa many years of happy 'retirement' in their chosen field of work after their return to the States.

Miss Slifer

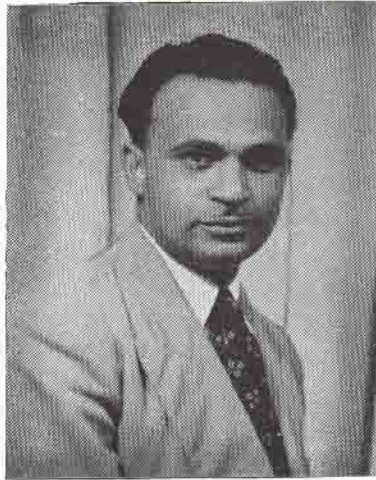

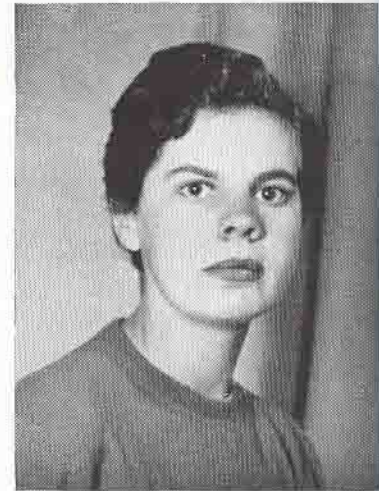
Miss Friesen

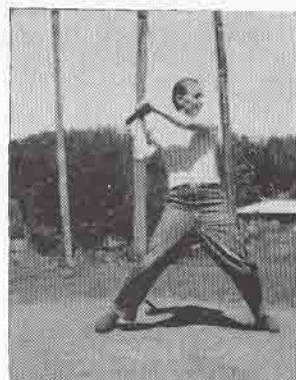
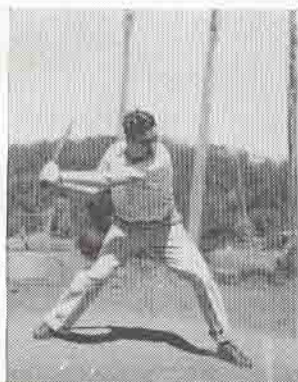
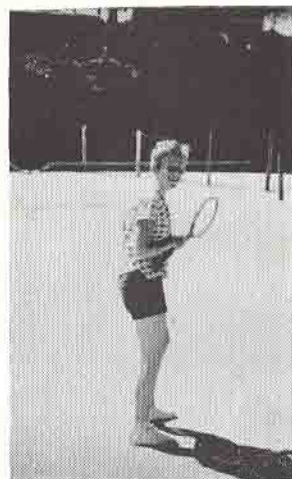
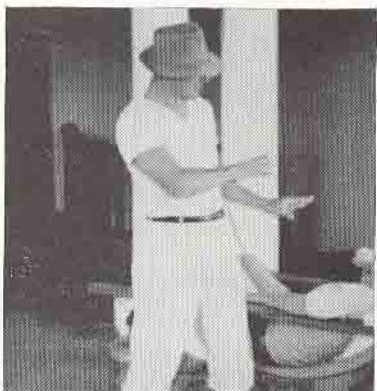


Miss Ruth

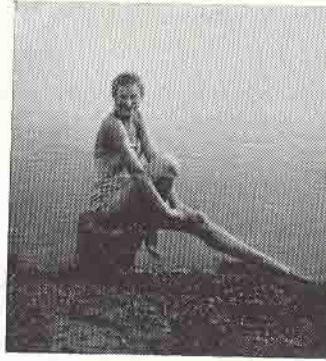

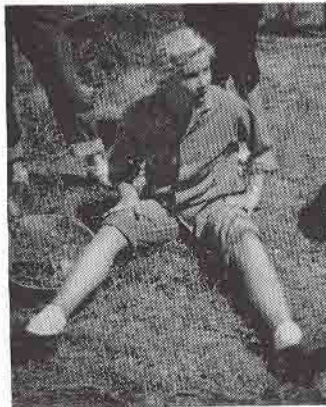


### ANNE DOROTHEA BORUTTA

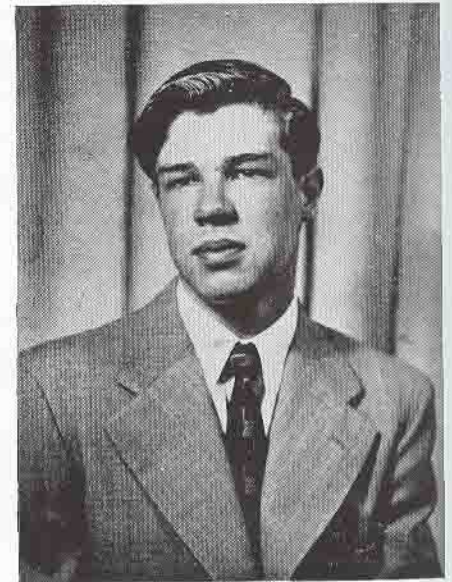

### CONSTANCE RICHMOND CAPEN

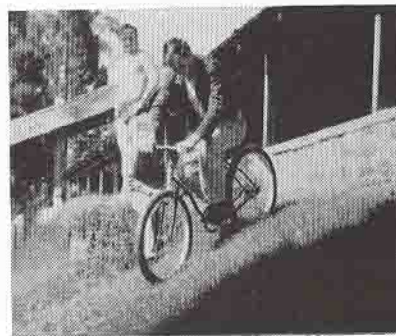

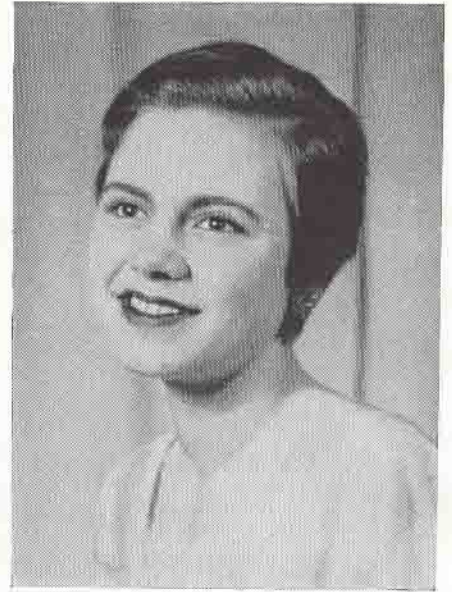
### WILBERT MORGAN GESLER

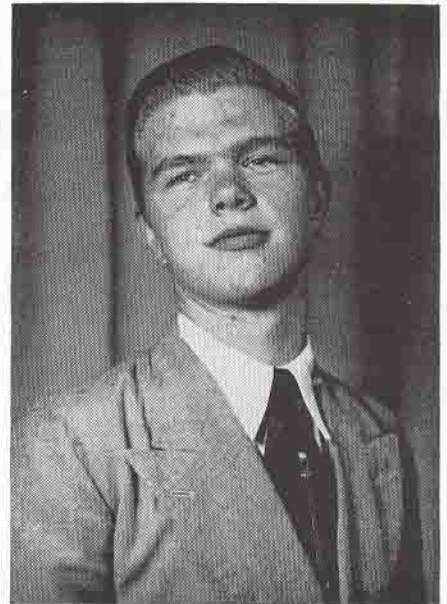

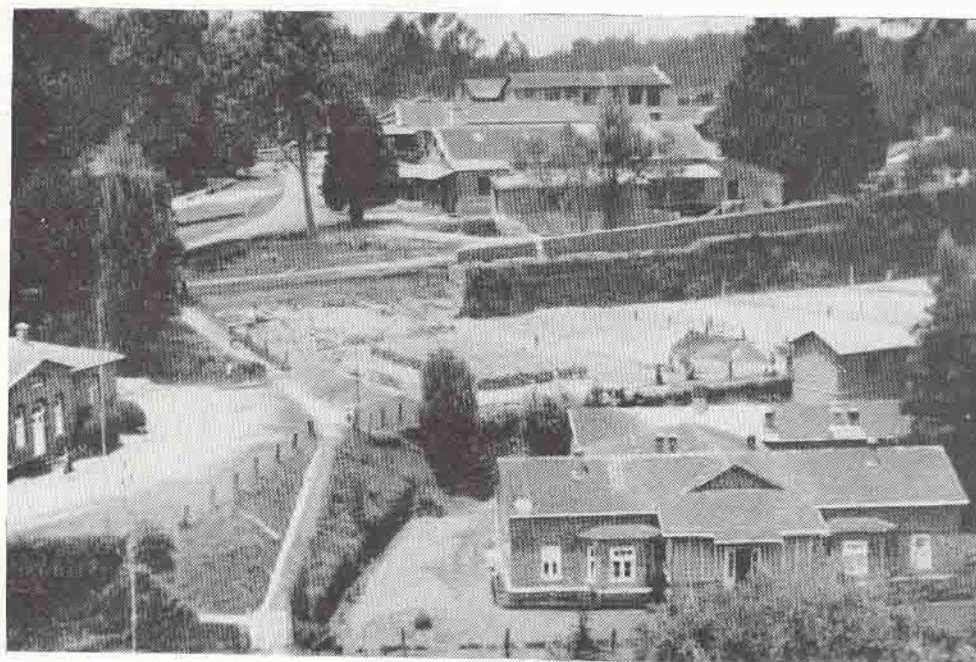

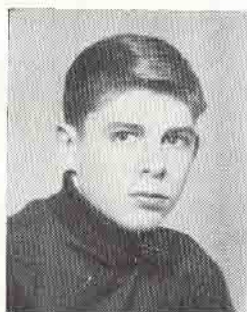


# JUNIORS

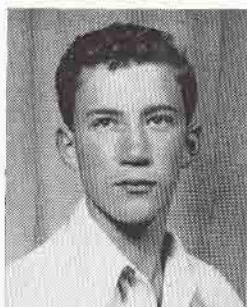

# FRESHMEN

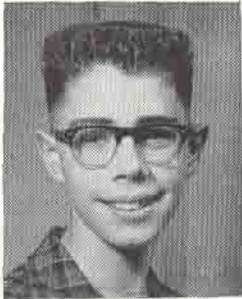

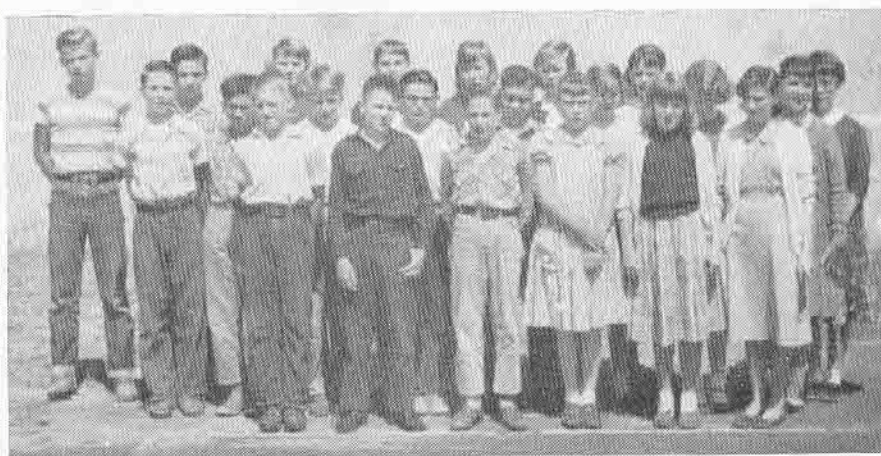
## EIGHTH GRADE

## THE CANTEEN

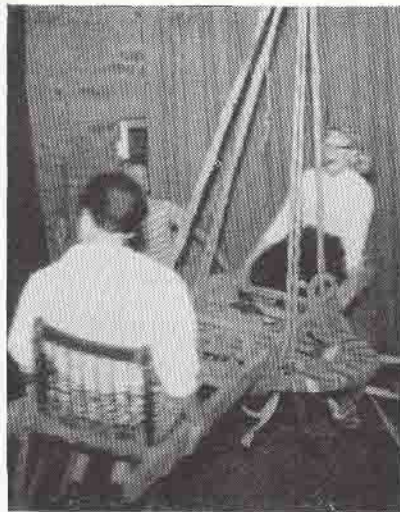

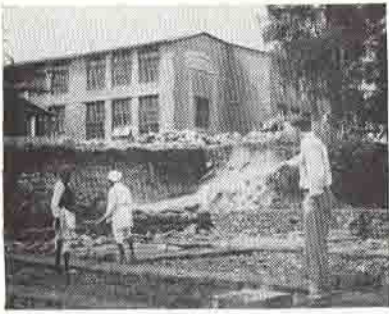
# ACTIVITIES

The inevitable Sunday night walks, and the frequent class get-togethers, especially appreciated by the Seniors, complete the week-end round of fun.





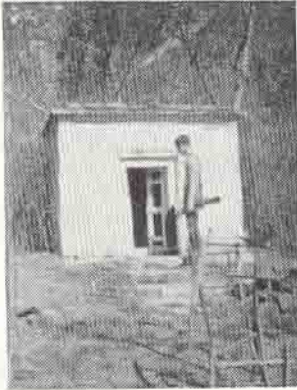

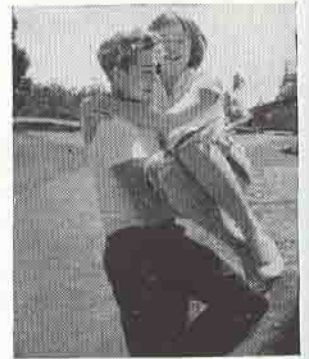

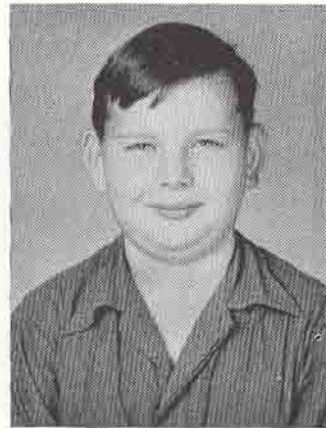
